It is telling that none of Lautenberg's House colleagues rose to his defense. Democratic county chairs and acknowledged party leaders remained silent as well.

Normally, the state chairman would intervene and attempt to dial down the rhetoric and negotiate a truce, but the heavyweight personalities involved in this fight appear to be beyond the control or persuasion of Chairman John Wisnewski.

The end game may be a concerted effort to persuade Lautenberg to retire when his current term ends in 2014 by warning that a serious and well-funded primary challenge awaits him and that he'll not enjoy the kind of broad-based party support that enabled a3 g
