

The poll of New Jersey registered voters was conducted by the Stockton Polling Institute of the William J. Hughes Center for Public Policy from Oct. 10-14, 2024. Stockton University students texted cell phones with deviations to take the survey online and Opinion Services supplemented draling portion of the fieldwork, which consisted of cell and landlines telephone calls. Overall, 91% of interviews were conducted on cell phones and 9% on landline phones. In terms of mode, 65% were reached via dialing and 35% were reached via text-to-web. A random sample of 616 New Jersey registered voters were interviewed. Both cell and landline samples consisted of pendom digit dialing (RDD) and voter list sample from MSG. Data are weighted based on U.S.
