Stockton to Offer Degree in Exercise Science Program in Fall 2016

The School of Health Sciences will offer a new Bachelor of Science degree program in the growing feld of Exercise Science beginning Fall 2016.

Exercise Science is the study of human movement. It includes interdisciplinary training in academic areas such as exercise physiology, nutrition, biomechanics, strength training, ftness assessment, exercise prescription, anatomy and physiology. Students will learn to conduct and evaluate health and ftness assessments, design and implement exercise programs based upon assessment fndings, and to monitor health and ftness changes and progression over time.

Graduates of an Exercise Science program can work in a variety of careers. The undergraduate degree could also enable interested candidates to go on to advanced degree programs such as Stockton's Doctorate of Physical Therapy.

The program will begin in September with up to 50 students projected in the frst class. Enrollment will expand gradually over four years, with additional faculty to be hired for a projected enrollment of 200 or more. New facilities, such as a lab


Rokita presented "Birding the Pinelands," which began inside a laboratory with an overview of the species that can be observed on and near the campus.
