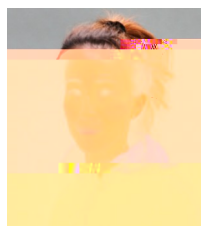
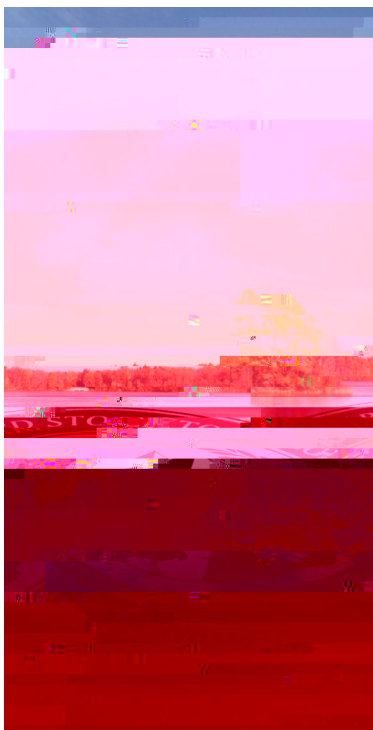

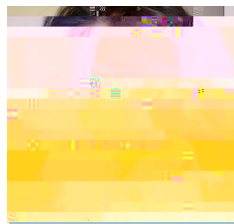

Eight new courses have been approved in the School of General Studies following a "productive, fun and really engaging" meeting on Friday, Sept. 27, said Dean Robert Gregg. The courses will be added to the curriculum starting in 2014, two in the spring and the rest in the fall.

Under General Arts and Humanities (GAH), two new courses will be offered. Hannah Ueno, associate professor of Art, developed a new course on creativity that will introduce the students to some of the most amazing minds and creative work from around the world and throughout history. Philip Polsinelli, assistant director of Southern Regional ETTC, has created a new course, "Good Vibrations" that focuses on the history of audio production from Thomas Edison to the present.

General Integration and Synthesis (GIS) welcomes a new course on quilting from Cindy King, associate professor of Creative Writing. The course will examine quilts from many different angles including their history and contribution to different societies and cultures, and will incorporate poetry and fiction.

Under General Natural Sciences and Mathematics (GNM), two new courses will be available. Adam Aguiar, assistant professor of Biology, will instruct a new class dealing with marine conservation, ecology, and saltwater fishing, specifically striped bass fishing. Dr. Catherine Tredick, assistant professor of Environmental Studies, will help students understand wildlife conservation in a new course that focuses on worldwide conservation and the biological, cultural, social, and political issues that have a bearing on the viability of wildlife populations.

General Studies (GENS) will offer two new courses. Nestor Smith, an adjunct instructor in SOBL and a regulatory and compliance attorney, developed a course on insurance law. Dr. Aakash Taneja, associate professor of Computer Science and Information Systems, will be teaching a course focused on Cyber Security.

A new course in General Social Sciences (GSS), "The Amazing Baby," will investigate the growth and development of the human infant. Dr. Mary Padden, assistant professor of Nursing, said the course will focus on global perspectives regarding infants, on ethical issues, and on gender.
